

David Richards, project treasurer, writes

Firstly we need to give thanks! Since the launch gift day in mid-2006 God has provided us with almost a fifth of a million pounds in less than three years! Praise the Lord!

Paying all the professional fees and planning costs from this sum leaves £50,000 in the kitty. The £170,000 promised from the Sunday School Fund and a notional target figure of £30,000 in grant money move the total to a quarter of a million pounds.

Let's assume that with contingencies, furniture and a first instalment to a mission project we will need to find significantly more than a million in the next 18 months. **How on earth do we do that?**

The answer is **we** don't! **We pray** that God will enable us to do it.

Recently we have been offered a significant interest-free loan/gift which will take us back towards the £1 million target, so our gap looks like £750,000. However, the maximum bank loan we can contemplate is £500,000 – assuming we can get one! Thus our immediate target questions are these:

(1) Can we raise £100,000 in gifts and £150,000 in congregational interest-free loans in the next year to reach the £1 million?

(2) Can we achieve £30,000 each year for 5 years as a 'gift day' lump sum AND £33,000 in regular giving to repay the loans?

The current thinking is that initially we would pay interest only on the bank loan facility and would repay the congregational loans over five years with the annual gift day sums. As the large promised loan is converted to a series of gifts over five years, the gift aid tax recovery would lead to an annual surplus, even after building up the mission project fund at 10% of total giving. At the end of the five years we could then convert the original £500,000 loan into a £450,000

mortgage over 25 years. Annual repayments at 5.5% on this would be £33,000. Hence the target figures above!

That's our thinking which shows that it is possible - if our hearts are right.

However, God Almighty will do it his way! Let's pray on for his provision and perfect timing.

David Walker, our project chairman, writes

Let us give thanks that after four years of thinking about, planning, and designing our new Church Hall, we are now almost ready to start the rebuilding works.

On the 22nd May the Project Design Team will be sending a very detailed pack of information to six builders and will be asking them to submit their best price for constructing the new building. By the end of June we will be able to choose one of those builders and thereafter we will be working with that firm during July and August to see if we can find ways of reducing their tender price, but without compromising on the quality of the materials. **The price will then be fixed for a six month period.**

Whilst this work is progressing, we anticipate that the PCC will be able to complete the purchase of the Church Hall site from the Chester Diocese. Again there have been lengthy negotiations over the last two years but the legal documents have now been drafted and should be exchanged during the summer.

Therefore, subject to us having the necessary finance, the redevelopment could start in September.

The physical state of the existing Hall is deteriorating rapidly and it is quite possible that, after another winter, part of that building will be unfit to use. It is therefore essential that we do everything we can to start the works during the six month open tender period.

The raising of the finance might appear as a huge challenge in uncertain economic times but God is in control of all things and He knows our needs even before we ask. Our Heavenly Father has already heard our prayers regarding our desire to continue and expand His Gospel Work and He alone has brought us to the point where we can almost begin the new building. **He will continue to lead us if we ask Him and it would be wonderful to see the whole Church Family gathering together to do so at the start of our half night of Prayer and Praise on 3rd June. Our Lord is faithful and we can trust Him.**
